\$100 a rider Teams must consist of 5 members CALF BRANDING

In the branding pen there will be 10 cows and 10 calves with numbers displayed. One member of the team will rope the designated numbered calf by the heels - one or two feet is legal. Time will start and the drawn number will be called when the roper's horse's nose crosses the line at the entrance of the pen. The roper must drag the calf across the line by walking or trotting only. If the horse lopes at any time, the team will receive a 'not time'. At no point will the horse be allowed to lope with the calf in tow. The remaining team members must not touch the calf before it crosses the line. The members may touch the rope before the calf crosses the line, but under no circumstances will touching the calf prior to completely crossing the designated line be allowed. This will result in an immediate 'no time'. The calf must be flanked and held to the ground with all ropes removed before the brander is allowed to leave the branding pot circle. Brander shall then brand the calf and return the branding iron to the branding pot circle for time to stop. Two minute time limit for the calf branding event.

TRAILER LOADING

At the far end of the arena will be 10 cattle numbered 0 to 9. The drawn number will be called when the first member of the team crosses the designated herd line and time will start. The team must sort their numbered cow out of the herd, push across the line clean, then rope the cow by a legal head catch. The team must then load the animal in the trailer and remove ALL ropes. All ropes must be free from the inside or outside of the trailer. Four members of the team must get into the front of the pickup and shut all doors to the pickup for time to stop. The remaining fifth member of the team is to remain horseback. Team will receive a 'no time' if any trash crosses the designated herd line at any time! If a wrong number crosses the line before the designated cow number crosses, the team will receive a 'no time'. Two minute time limit with a 5 loop limit.

PEN AND DOCTOR

At the far end of the arena will be 10 horned cattle and 20 muley cattle numbered 0 to 9. The drawn number will be called when the first team member crosses the designated herd line and time will begin. There will be a 12'x12' pen with a gate placed approximately 12' off the arena fence. Riders must sort their 2 muley cattle from the herd and pen them in the placed pen and close the gate. Riders must also sort their horned cow from the herd, push it across the designated herd



line, head and heel the cow and put it on the ground. The team must then remove all ropes for time to be called. Cattle may be sorted in any order as to the three designated numbered cattle. Team will be allowed 5 loops total to head and heel the horned cow. Head catch must be a legal head catch and heel may be one or two feet. Muley cattle must be penned before the horned cow can be roped. If penned muley cattle escape from the pen before time is called, a no time will result. There will be no trash allowed at any time during this event. 5 loop limit with a 3 minute time limit.

TEAM SORTING

At the far end of the arena will be 12 head of cattle numbered 0 to 9 and 2 cattle without numbers. Team will be given a drawn number and time will start when the first team member crosses the designated herd line. The team must then sort the cattle starting with their called number in numerical order. If any cow crosses the line out of the designated sort order, or if an already sorted cow comes back across the line towards the herd, a 'no time' will result. **90 second time limit.**

TEAM PENNING

At the far end of the arena will be 30 head of muley cattle. There will be numbers from 0 to 9 on three sets of the thirty. Each team's draw number will be called when time starts at the designated start point. Each team must sort their three like numbered cattle from the herd and pen the three like numbered cattle in the designated penning corral. A total of 5 head will be allowed across the trash line at any time, but only the three like numbered cattle can be in the pen for time to stop. If a wrong number is in the pen, he must be removed for time to stop. If the herd of cattle "drift" across the trash line, the judge will have discretion to allow more than the 5 head across the line, but if the team **PUSHES** more than the five head across, a 'no time' will result. **Three minute time limit.**



COMMISSIONERS APPROVE FUNDS FOR QUIN LEWIS FAIRGROUNDS PROJECT



The Chaffee County Commissioners approved matching funds for a local project to improve the Chaffee County Fairgrounds' livestock pavilion at their Aug. 15 meeting.

Quin Lewis, who brought the project forward, has been part of 4H since she was 8 years old. At the July 28 junior livestock sale, which Commissioner Greg Felt attended, Lewis donated her earnings from the sale of her third animal, a sheep, to the Fairgrounds Committee, amounting to around \$3,000.

"Because since I've been in 4H for so long and I'm kind of nearing my final years, I really want to give back to the organization that has given me so much," Lewis said. "I donated the proceeds from my reserve grand championship. My original intent was just to donate the proceeds, and that was going to be it. But a lot of businesses liked my idea and the cause and continued to donate, as well."

At the end of the night, Lewis' donation led to \$8,086.90 being raised. The livestock scale, she said, is very old and outdated. While it is validated yearly, problems arose this year with unreliable weights, leading to some families being unable to sell their animals as they were below weight. The scale is also available to the whole county.

The inside of the scale house and front gate are in need of repair, as are the hoses and spouts in the watering pen and fences and gates around the pavilion. She also hopes to add and improve monitoring cameras.

"The watering pens...are where everyone washes their animals before competition," she said. "As you can see, (the gates and locks) don't line up and they do not lock. So in the morning, it's kind of a rodeo for everyone to wash them down ... and a lot of people and parents are trying to stand in front of the gates to keep them closed, but it's pretty hard to have a 300-pound pig pushing against you.

"As for the monitoring cameras, me and some other 4H-ers felt that it's time that some different security measures were put in place," she said. "Especially this year, there was some question about people who were feeding the animals cotton candy and stuff that they shouldn't be eating, and also just being unkind to the animals. So we think it's time to have those security cameras there just to ensure the well-being of the animals and to make sure that they're safe."

Lewis requested a match of her existing funds, and the commissioners moved to allocate \$11,913.10, rounding out the funds to \$20,000.

"Thank you for bringing these projects and ideas to our attention and for exercising some initiative on it," said Commissioner Keith Baker. "Rather than just lamenting the fact, you're doing something about it."

"What Quin did took (the evening) to another level. It was just an amazing act of leadership because she did not ask for anything. She just lead by example, and walked out of the room," Felt said. "The response was just really organic and kind of intuitive but totally logical and tremendously impactful. I have to think that not only did she change the course of that particular evening and create an opportunity for improvement there, but I think that this may well set an example for future sales and sort of taking the 4H ethic to a higher level."

The funds will be set aside for the Fair Committee, and the commissioners added that they would invite Lewis and other representatives from 4H to be part of the conversation on the improvements.

"It's important that they have voice, and if we're going to do improvements on their behalf, we want to make sure that they're appropriate and are gonna work with the vision," Felt said.

Felt moved to allocate the additional \$11,913.10 to the Quin Lewis project and direct the fair committee to work on spending the money wisely and in concert with an advisory group of 4H kids, led by Lewis. Wood "wholeheartedly" seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

- B. Each exhibit must be entered under the name of the person who made it.
- C. All exhibits must have been completed since September 1, 2022. Articles that have been previous award winners in competition are ineligible.
- D. All exhibits will be awarded a ribbon. A champion and reserve champion will be awarded in all classes, if merited. Rosettes awarded to best overall exhibit in each division.
- E. Exhibits that do not follow class descriptions will be disqualified.
- F. New classes may be created on entry day only

when the following condition is met: When there are two or more entries which do not logically fit into established classes.

G. County Fair classes are not necessarily descriptive of, or included as, classes for entry at Colorado State Fair. See www.coloradostatefair.com for entry rules for State Fair.

PANTRY DIVISION

- 1. Each exhibitor is allowed two entries per class of different food products items judged separately.
- 2. Any canned item that is not properly sealed and labeled (or shows leaks or spoilage) will not be accepted for entry. All canned products must have labels (no names, please), stating name of product, method of pack where applicable (hot pack or cold/raw pack), method of processing (water bath or pressure canned), process time, altitude, and date canned.

Example: Product Pitted Cherries

Method: Raw Pack (water bath or pressure

canned)

Time: 28 minutes (pints)

Altitude: 7,000 feet

Date: September, 2022

All canned products shall be packed in clean, clear standard brand name jars, (no mayonnaise jars, etc.), sealed with new clean seals, processed since September 2012.

Canned fruits and vegetables will not be opened, but will be judged on appearance in the jar. Other canned items will be opened and tasted at the discretion of the judge.

- 3. Jams, jellies, preserves and marmalades must be water bath processed. **No paraffin allowed.**
- 4. Pies -- all pies must be in foil disposable pie pans. Crusts must be two-crust, lattice or woven lattice pastry. Filling must be homemade, fresh or canned fruit (no cream pies).
- 5. Jerky recipes must use Colorado State



University recommended procedures. Deer and elk meat are to include a copy of test results for Chronic Wasting Disease. (CWD test mandatory and a copy must be provided for the judge, Contact 539-6447 if questions)

TEXTILE, HOBBIES, CRAFTS, AND MISCELLANEOUS HANDWORK DIVISIONS






